## TREASURER'S REPORT

April 30, 2016

**F**or the month of April we had operating income of \$94,914 and operating expenses of \$87,928 resulting in an operating profit for the month of \$6,986. Year to date we have had operating income of \$362,149 and operating expenses of \$348,399 resulting in an operating profit year to date of \$13,750.

Our month cash balances were operating \$167,784 and replacement funds \$83,904.

There were no additions to fixed assets in the month of April.



## TREASURER'S REPORT

May 31, 2016

**F**or the month of May we had operating income of \$86,159 and operating expenses of \$81,922 resulting in an operating profit for the month of \$4,237. Year to date our operating income was \$448,308 and our operating expenses were \$430,321 resulting in an operating profit year to date of \$17,987.

Our month end cash balances were operating \$169,120 and replacement funds \$94,275.

Additions to fixed assets for the month were the audio system \$5,664 which was donated by the social clubs, mainly the mens club, and \$1,400 for the engineer for plans to renovate the pool shower rooms.

## FROM THE OFFICE

We are now in Hurricane Season and everyone should have a plan for what to do in the event we have a storm. We have forms at the office that need to be filled out along with a piece of red paper that should be put in your window to indicate someone is in residence. However, if we do have a hurricane, you must evacuate a mobile home. You must also register with the county each year if you have any special needs.

With all this hot weather, the pool is busy and we want everyone to be aware of the Rules covering the pool and spa. We are seeing violations of these rules so please take the time to read them and adhere to these Regulations:

## SWIMMING POOL AREA RULES AND REGULATIONS

31. Swimming pool, spa/hot tub, sauna and shower rooms are for the use of residents and their guests only. No one under 18 years of age allowed in the spa/hot tub building. Use of these facilities is at your own risk. Hours are as posted at the pool.

32. A robe or suitable cover is mandatory when walking or riding to and from the pool area in bathing attire.

33. Resident identification tags shall be in the resident's possession at the swimming pool. Oakwood Manor guests tags and a copy of the pool rules shall be furnished for guests at the park office or by the pool official. All tags shall be visible.

34. Residents shall be responsible for their guest's conduct in these areas at all times.

35. To aid in the Association's compliance with Florida Statute, 514.031, (1), (a), 5. Everyone using pools must shower at the pool area, not at home, before entering swimming pool or spa/hot tub.

36. Children under 2 years of age or not bathroom trained are not permitted in the swimming pool. Swim diapers are not permitted in the swimming pool. All children under 14 years of age shall be accompanied by an adult resident or guest.

37. Running, jumping, and "horseplay" are prohibited inside swimming pool area fence at all times.

38. The safety rope shall remain in place at all times. The rope is a safety device to define the deep end of the pool. No playing or hanging on rope.

39. Diving in the swimming pool is prohibited.

40. Glass containers of any kind are prohibited inside swimming pool area fence at all times. Food, drinks, furniture and any other objects are prohibited inside the blue line.

41. Persons using suntan oils/lotions shall cover chairs before using them and shall remove suntan oils/lotions from their body with a shower using soap before re-entering swimming pool.

42. Air floats and balls shall be prohibited in the swimming pool. Snorkeling shall be prohibited in the pool. The use of body type safety devices by adults and children shall be permitted in shallow end of the swimming pool. Chil-

dren shall be accompanied at the pool by an adult resident at all times.

43. It is the duty of all residents and guests to obey the rules and help enforce rules by alerting violators of their infractions. Your cooperation will be appreciated.

44. Do not go into the swimming pool, spa/hot tub or sauna alone. For your health and safety, it is suggested you do not stay in the spa/hot tub or sauna for more than fifteen (15) minutes.

45. No person may use the swimming pool and/or swimming pool area in such a manner as to hinder or encroach upon the rights of other residents of the park or their guests.

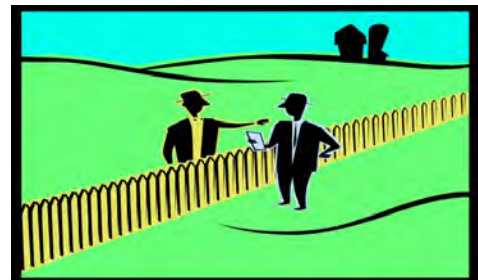

## PICKLEBALL NEWS

**G**eorges and I started playing pickleball in the winter of 2014 inside Arlington Park's gymnasium in Sarasota. Then and still now, we were also playing tennis 3 mornings a week at the Youth Complex courts, corner of Tuttle and 17<sup>th</sup> Street. We were ready to try something new, with less running, and pickleball was suggested to us by some of our tennis partners. After a few tries and after learning how to keep score, we were sold!

While still in Florida, we bought a pickleball net, a few paddles and balls, to bring back with us to Quebec, hoping to teach and play with our grandchildren. They loved it. We spotted a perfect location in our home town, an outdoor hockey rink unused in mild weather. We approached the City of Bromont authorities to see if we could use that municipal venue, and draw lines to trace a pickleball court with chalk. They had never heard of pickleball before and were hesitant at first, but finally said yes. Friends soon joined us to try the game. They loved it too. Word got around fast, and snowbirds like us who had tried the game in Florida and were looking for a place to play in Quebec, joined us too. We went back to our town's sports director and convinced her that pickleball was the new thing, perfect for active seniors, and that the town should back us up. We got in touch with the Federation québécoise de pickleball, and they were helpful and supportive.

Finally, we got permission to paint lines for 6 pickleball courts, inside that outdoor rink in Bromont. In 2015, we formed a club and by the end of the year, we had reached 67 members. To join the Club Pickleball Bromont, the cost is \$20 if you are a resident, and \$40 if you come from another town. We had our first pickleball tournament last year in August, it was a big success and winners in the 3 categories, mens', womens' and mixed doubles were awarded trophies. We had a big year-end party

## SHUFFLE CLUB NEWS

**W**e have been out of "Oakwood" for a month already. I love the fact that even though we are not "at home" we are still able to connect and see what is happening in Florida. We saw the shared article about the fire at "The Packing House". We loved to eat there. The atmosphere was so "earthy crunchy".

We have traveled through many states to our settled spot near WHITE PIGEON, MICHIGAN. When one asks, where in Michigan, only those who have or do live there, know the proper way to mark your spot. With your hand held high, the thumb to the right, you point to where on the Michigan map, the spot that is your location. So our spot for a few months, is located near the very bottom, smack dab in the middle of the state. Due South of Kalamazoo and Grand Rapids. The other Pigeon, Michigan is located in the thumb.

A few facts about this little spot in Michigan. For those of you traveling south on U. S. 131, to Indiana would know this spot on the map, but what you may not know is how the town got it's name.

As the legend goes, back in early 1800's at a meeting of the Council of Indian Chiefs gathered in the Detroit Area, Chief Wahbememe, which means Chief White Pigeon, overheard plans to attack the settlement which is now White Pigeon. The Chief was a friend of the white settlers and had given his word of friendship and his protection. He is quoted as saying "to betray my village of the white people is to betray myself". While at this meeting with the Council of Chiefs, he over heard of an Indian

tribes plans to raid his white village. He immediately left the meeting to warn his people. He ran the entire way back to the village (approx 150 miles) to warn them of the pending attack. Because of the efforts of Chief White Pigeon, The settlers were able to protect their village.

Chief White Pigeon then died of heart failure from the exhaustion of running all that distance. He gave his friendship, his protection and his life for what he believed in. At the intersection of U. S. 131 and U. S. 12 in the Wahebmememe Memorial Park, is the tombstone with the information of this historic event.

The Memorial Park is a beautiful little spot honoring not only, Chief Wahbememe, but other heros as well. You will find memorial bricks and honoring bricks for those from the area that gave their lives and years in service to our country. The little park is a beautiful spot, well maintained and such an honor to the sons and daughters of the local residents. One name listed is that of Glenn E. Yoder( Shirley's brother). As we stroll thru the memorial bricks, we recognize many names from my childhood.

Each year during the month of July this sleepy little town comes alive with an event "WHITE PIGEON DAYS." Always a big event for the locals, the parade quite often will have a float with decedents of Chief White Pigeon leading the parade. This small town takes great pride in honoring the family of the chief that "saved the village"

White Pigeon was incorporated in 1837, and is the oldest incorporated village in Michigan. Downtown boasts an historic building listed on the National Register of Historic Places, the United States Land office, which is the oldest
